### 8. Presentation and demonstration from Dr. Sanjay Goel, SUNY Albany

- Dr. Sanjay Goel, a Program Director at SUNY Albany and Founder and Director of the School of Business' Department of Digital Forensics, serves as the associate dean of Cybersecurity for the University, is the director of research at the New York Center for Information Forensics and Assurance, and is the director of the University's Forensics Analytics Complexity Energy Transportation and Security Center.
- Dr. Goel discussed with the Board on the Bachelor of Science in Digital Forensics degree at UAlbany. This degree is looking forward into the next decade of technology. Students will develop a solid foundation of learning by solving problems. Students will be studying the hardware and operation systems of computers, networks and electronic devices. They will also learn how to collect data from a variety of sources and learn techniques required to analyze data sets. With a 100% job placement, students will have such career opportunities as to work in a consulting firm in cyber incident analysis or assist intelligence and homeland security agencies with collecting cyber intelligence and analyzing threats.
- Columbia-Greene has had a partnership with UAlbany with this program since 2014. Our faculty members: Clint Mossman, William DeLuca, Joe Scampoli and William Mathews, have been key resources for the continuation of this program.
- Dr. Goel also states that they have a 1-year intense master's program: "Digital Forensics and Cyber Security Master of Science". In this program students can specialize in one of three tracks: Cyber Security, Digital Forensics and Cyber Operations.
  Upon completion of Dr. Goel's presentation in the Boardroom, the Board of Trustees moved to room 125 for a demonstration by Associate Professor, Clint Mossman. Associate Professor Mossman demonstrated the following examples of possible computer hacks:
  - A Keyboard logger, which captures every keystroke a user makes on their device and send that information to a remote system (so someone can therefore capture someone's username and password)
  - The Wi-Fi Pineapple, which is a device that acts as a hotspot. The device will act as the man in the middle and will be transparent to the user. The user will connect into the hotpot, instead of the wireless access point.
    - (Some of our board members could see this occur on their own cell phones).

We would undoubtedly need to pursue a grant opportunity to make this happen — and we would engage Greene County Legislators in this initiative.

### **Admissions Updates**

Thanks to Bruce Bohnsack, for sending us the Out of Alignment report on the Mid-Hudson Region from the Great Recession to 2030. The information certainly gives us pause with respect to the efforts we will be needing to make in recruiting and retaining students. Spring registration opened last Monday, and the new Assistant Dean of Enrollment Management Ann Bruno is launching some tactics that include a new Admissions Packet mailed to prospective students. The immediate interest is the follow up with students who filled out Inquiry Cards at the Open House last Saturday.

#### **High School Updates**

College in the High School is up 20 students from 2018 (386 – 406); hours up 119 (1703 to 1822). Two weeks ago, the College hosted teachers from Ichabod Crane High School who did not know about CoGreene's Auto Technology programs. - Chairman Schneier, is working with SUNY on the unappointed trustees' positions on the Board.
- Trustee, Bianchi reported he will be giving a report on the investment policies on the Foundation at the November Board meeting.

#### 11. Vice President's Reports

Vice President and Dean of Administration, Dianne Topple reported:

- Phase 3 of the construction project is moving along. The CTC replacements windows have arrived undamaged and will be installed shortly.
  - With construction starting on Monday, November 4, there are offices on campus that are needed to be moved to other locations. Everyone has been very cooperative in the moving of these temporary office locations.
- The Finance software of Banner, went live on November 1
- The Argos report writing software, will be used in the software updates on campus.
- Human Resources and Payroll will go live on January 1, 2020. The staff members for these departments will be in training every week, until we become live on January 1.
- Due to Banner implementation, we will be making a change to our existing payroll calendar. Dean Topple will be meeting with Faculty, Staff and Administrators to let everyone know of these changes.

 Auditors will be on campus on November 17, and the final financial statements will be given in the January board meeting.

Vice President and Dean of Academic Affairs, George Timmons reported:

- 1. The Office of Academic Affairs is grateful for the faculty and staff that organized and volunteered their time to support the Hope Rocks Concert, the College Open House, the Car Show and the Car-Care event.
- 2. T-TEN Update: After several conversations internally and with the Toyota T-TEN leadership the College has decided to teach-out the T-TEN 2020 class and determine if recruiting for Summer 2021 semester is a viable option.
- 3. The College has signed an agreement with EMSI, the organization that conducted the College's Economic Impact Study, to perform the Program Gap analysis for both credit and non-credit programs. The results will provide recommendations for programs that have reached the end of their life cycle, current programs with potential to perform better and new program recommendations. In addition, the College has purchased a 3-year subscription to an EMSI product called Analyst. Analyst is a product used by the Department of Labor that will allow the College to access local county / regional statistics and information for the development of credit and non-credit programs. (Information provided includes the number of specific posted jobs, the name of the employer, number of program regional completions, potential competitors, and other information useful for determining program viability).
- 4. In addition to Banner, the College is also in the midst of a Campus Labs conversion. Campus Lab is the College's new assessment software. The total conversion time is expected to be 6-8 weeks. Dr. Casey O'Brian is leading this initiative.
- 5. On October 17, President Drummer and Assistant Dean Carol Doerfer attended a meeting with Greene County Administrators, Warren Hart and Karl Heck, as well as elected and community representatives from Cairo to discuss the feasibility of a "satellite" campus at the Cairo Library to offer credit and non- credit courses. Content areas of possible interest include Advanced Manufacturing, Allied Health, Business, HVAC, Electrician, Hospitality and Culinary Arts.
- 6. The Dean attended the SUNY Association of Chief Academic Officers Fall Conference. Agenda items included but not limited to:
  - a. a presentation from Middle States Commission on Higher Education representative Dr. Christy L. Fashion, Senior Vice President for Accreditation Relations,
  - b. a presentation Dr. Tod Laursen, SUNY Provost, a presentation from Robert E. Ruggeri, Senior Managing Counsel, Office of General Counsel SUNY. In addition, there were a host of sector and regional meetings. It is important to note as a result of the conference, a significant outcome was the new Provost at the University at Albany has agreed to host the capital district region institutions (Columbia-Greene Community College, Hudson Valley Community College, Schenectady County Community College, Adirondack Community College, SUNY Albany and SUNY Cobleskill) to invite a dialogue on ways we can enhance collaboration efforts and build stronger relationship.
- 7. The Spring 2020 semester is the premier of the College's revised course schedule format. Some of the benefits of the schedule are:

- a. The schedule is a student-centered approach as it still accommodates students desire for a two-day schedule.
- b. It allows for designated meeting times that do not conflict with the activity period. It will allow faculty to attend more student/college events.
- c. This will give the faculty the option of offering/scheduling office hours during the activity period when students are available. Often, faculty office hours do not accommodate student schedules.
- d. It allows for better decision making when the college needs to determine closures or openings due to inclement weather.

Vice President and Dean of Students and Enrollment Management, Joseph Watson reported:

- 1. The REACH Center is observing Domestic Violence Awareness, this week on campus.
- 2. The Student Life Committee will be having free mocktails for students during the upcoming activities period. There will also be free literature for students as a part of National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week.
- 3. We had two therapy pigs on campus, which were enjoyed by all. A thank you to Michele DeCarlo, for making the arrangements to have them here.
- 4. Catherine Carlson, President of NYS Services Council, attended a meeting comprised of over 300 disability support services college campuses in New York State.
- 5. David Shawb, a professional speaker on leadership, spoke last week was on campus.
- 6. A big thank you to Student Senate for a successful Spirit Week.
- 7. This weekend the Women's Soccer team will have a sophomore recognition day, for it is the last game of the season. Also, Goalie Keegan Deyo as of this afternoon, is rank #2 in the country with 215 saves.
