7. President's Report

Welcome Aboard!

Today Columbia-Greene welcomes two new employees: Matthew Green, Assistant Dean for Enrollment Management; and Christopher Nardone, Director of Workforce Investment Office.

Responses to Racist Events

Given the horrific events that have unfolded in our country during the last several weeks, I crafted a letter to the C-GCC Community, signed by the Executive Cabinet members, to denounce systemic racism and oppression. The 30 SUNY community college Presidents, Chief Academic Officers, and Chief Student Services Officers also wrote letters to stand in solidarity with the Black Lives Matter movement.

Several members of the College Senate are developing a plan for a series of programs during the 2020 – 2021 academic year that will focus on the topic of systemic racism and engage the entire community through keynote speakers, panel discussions, brown bag lunches, and the like. Also, under consideration is the opportunity to launch a "One Book, One College" initiative whereby the entire College will read a work related to the topic or systemic racism.

"Restart" Plan

Earlier this month, the 30 community college Presidents agreed to having consistency within the sector regarding the fall "reopening". As of right now, all of the colleges will be primarily offering classes using the online or remote modality, with the exception of courses that cannot be taught virtually such as art studios (figure drawing, ceramics), auto tech, building construction tech, and science labs. On June 5, the Presidents sent a "Restart Plan Summary" to the Chancellor covering these major areas: academic program planning, restarting on-campus operations, tracing and monitoring, communication and outreach plan, and the resources and time required to restart. The Chancellor will be forwarding our plan summaries to Governor Cuomo for his review. We expect to hear guidance from him by mid-July.

Task Forces Update

The two Task Forces I mentioned at last month's meeting – CoGreene Forward Operations and CoGreene Forward Academics – have been meeting regularly and continue to flush out plans with respect to the reopening. Obviously, every strategy must comport with the Governor's and SUNY guidelines. The safety of our students and employees must come first in any scenario.

Cares Act

The College FINALLY received the CARES Act funding for students (\$420,354), and Financial Aid is busy reaching out to students who may be in dire need of assistance. The colleges still await guidance on the allocation of funds for the institution (\$420,353).

Student Emergency Fund

Last month, I reported that SUNY received a \$5 million anonymous donation to support a Student Emergency Fund for students dramatically impacted by the pandemic. Each community college will have the opportunity to match a \$50,000 grant distributed by SUNY by July 1, 2020. I thank all the Trustees and the Foundation Board members for their support and am happy to report we have surpassed \$30,000 in donations so far! We

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have two weeks to go, and Joan Koweek remains confident that we will reach – and possibly exceed – the \$50,000 goal.

College in the High School

Dawn-Marie Blasl followed up on the College in the High School "Hats off to you!" campaign launched during Teacher Appreciation week last month, with another outreach initiative of appreciation targeting the guidance counselors, principals, and superintendents. Each received a C-GCC mask with a card reading, "You always have us covered – now, it's our turn. Together, we will go forward – safely and in style".

Enrollment Management

Matthew Green arrives at the ideal moment as we begin very aggressive admissions marketing for the fall, building on SUNY's statewide campaign for the community colleges, "Stay Near. Go Far." Building on this theme, I am sending a personal letter to all parents in our service area who have children graduating from high school and pointing out the benefits of starting college at C-GCC instead of going away to a four-year college or university.

And, in the "timing is everything" scenario, SUNY just announced a Pathways Scholars' Award of \$500 for every high school graduate with an 80 GPA or above who enrolls at C-GCC with the intention of completing the associate degree in two year. Students who take advantage of this opportunity will be entitled to an additional \$1,000 if they transfer to a SUNY university and complete the bachelor's degree in two years.

Budget

As Dianne Topple reported during the Finance Committee Meeting, the uncertainty surrounding the budget continues to be challenging. Chairman Schneier, Dianne, and I will be meeting with the Columbia and Greene County Chairmen and representatives from the Finance Committees this week to discuss some budget scenarios such as a 25 percent state reduction – even though nothing is concrete at this time.

Other

James Reynolds, the President of Mid-Hudson Cable, alerted me that the wi-fi "hot spots" I mentioned last month are now up and running so that students without internet service can have access. The "hot spots" are at the Boat Launch in Hudson, Dutchman's Landing in Catskill, Ashland Town Park and Quarry, and the C.D. Lane Park outside Windham in Maple Crest. These locations, combined with those "hot spots" GTel installed in and around Germantown, and those available at the Public Library parking areas, will give our students a number of access options. Many thanks to Trustee Bruce Bohnsack who started the ball rolling on this earlier in 2020.

The Co-Greene Academic Taskforce Committee had its first meeting on May 21. The committee discussed the various modalities of teaching for the fall semester to determined which option would best in for College. There were recommendations by

COLUMBIA GREENE COLLEGE faculty on how to offer face-to-face instruction. Also, the faculty provided input on appropriate PPE and cleaning protocol.

Division Chairs were charged with speaking to their division to identify which classes they thought should be listed in the kinetic learning category. Kinetic courses will be taught in the traditional face-to-face format due to the nature of the content. The purpose of this exercise is to determine how many courses and students will be on campus in the fall. The meeting concluded with a discussion regarding the professional development needs for the upcoming academic year.
